

COVID-19 Relief

Statewide COVID-19 Funding: \$15.6M to the Ohio Department of Health to support local health departments and other costs associated with the state's response to the COVID-19 pandemic.

SNAP Program: Early in the COVID-19 outbreak, Ohioans who are eligible for the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) could use their Ohio Direction cards to purchase food online through Walmart and Amazon. This went into effect June 3.

Pandemic Unemployment Assistance: In response to COVID-19, the Pandemic Unemployment Assistance (PUA) was made available to individuals experienc-

ing unemployment due to the pandemic. Leader Sykes has assisted 208 total unemployment related cases from House District 34.

Legislation Passed

Food Farmacy Pilot Program: \$500,000 of funding for the Food Farmacy Pilot Program, which will be working with the local hospital systems to create a sustainable, scalable project to help individuals diagnosed with obesity access nutritious food to improve their health.

Summit Metro Parks License Plate: HB 664 amended into SB 163 to create the Summit Metro Parks license plate to allow \$10 contribution to be used in support of the Summit Metro Parks.
