- HB 142 —Creates a four-year pilot program for coverage & provision of doula services





The redistricting process continues after the Ohio Supreme Court struck down both the state legislative and Congressional maps as unconstitutional in mid-January. The Court gave the Ohio Redistricting Commission 10 days to redraw the state legislative maps, and Republican commissioners adopted another set of partisan, four-year state maps on Jan. 22 without any Democratic support. The new state maps are now under review by the Court after voter rights advocates challenged the new maps as unconstitutional once again.

Meanwhile, the Legislature begins the second effort to draw fair and constitutional Congressional maps this month. Ohioans are still standing up and demanding fair maps that let them choose their representatives. I stand with you and continue to work for fair, constitutional ten year maps.

Space Heater Safety Tips

This winter, in our community and across the country we are seeing skyrocketing home energy costs. Many see small portable space heaters as a great way to keep warm and reduce energy bills. Improper use of these appliances, however, leads to an estimated 25,000 fires every year, according to California Casualty Insurance,

Keep these tips in mind to avoid a winter disaster in your home.

- Never use unvented combustion heaters indoors, instead consider an electric heater.
- Only use model that have current safety features like a tip over switch, which will automatically turn the heater off if it falls over and a Underwriter Laboratories (UL) label,
- Keep your heater on a had, level, non-flammable surface.
- Keep the heater at lease 3 feet away from flammable items like bedding, drapes, furniture and paper.
- Always turn the heater off when you leave the area and when you go to sleep.
- Avoid using extension cords and running cords under rugs or mats.
