

### State Representative Sean Patrick Brennan's Utility Subsidy Fight Results in \$500 Million in Customer Savings

COLUMBUS — **State Rep. Sean Patrick Brennan** (**Parma**) today announced that **House** (**HB**) **Bill 15**, which includes his provision to eliminate the controversial Ohio Valley Electric Corporation (OVEC) coal plant subsidy, takes effect today.

"This is a big win for Ohio consumers," said **Rep. Brennan.** "For years, Ohioans have been forced to pay hundreds of millions of dollars to subsidize

two outdated coal plants — one of which isn't even in Ohio. I'm proud that my provision in HB 15 finally ends this unnecessary, corruption-tainted subsidy."

The OVEC subsidies were created in 2019 as part of the scandal-ridden House Bill 6, which federal prosecutors have called the largest public corruption case in Ohio's history. Under the law, Ohio utility customers were required to pay monthly surcharges to subsidize the plants, regardless of whether they received electricity from OVEC. Since the policy took effect, Ohioans have paid hundreds of millions of dollars with no clear public benefit.

"With this provision, we're putting an end to a bad deal for ratepayers and sending a message that Ohio's energy policy should serve the public, not special interests," said **Rep. Brennan.** "This is about protecting working families, lowering utility costs, and restoring integrity to state government."

**Rep. Brennan**, who has repeatedly introduced and supported legislation to repeal the subsidies, said today's effective date marks a major step forward but also underscores the need to continue rooting out wasteful spending tied to HB 6.

"This fight was never about partisan politics — it was about doing the right thing," concluded **Rep. Brennan**. "Ohio families deserve an energy policy that's affordable, transparent, and focused on the future."

## State Representative Brennan Launches Flag Retirement Initiative

As a former civics teacher and the grandson of a U.S. Navy veteran, I've always believed that one of the most meaningful ways we can show respect for our nation is by honoring its most visible symbol - the American flag. That's why I'm proud to announce the launch of my **Flag Retirement Collection Program**, designed to give residents a respectful and convenient way to retire worn or damaged flags.

Too often, people aren't sure what to do with an old flag once it's no longer suitable for display. Rather than letting them sit unused or disposing of them improperly, this program provides a simple and dignified solution.

Specially marked collection bins are now available at all Cuyahoga County Public Library branches in Parma and Parma Heights, as

well as at **Grocery Outlet, 5721 Broadview Road**. Residents can drop off their flags at any time, knowing they will be retired with the honor they deserve.

The collected flags will be handled in accordance with the **U.S. Flag Code** and respectfully retired through ceremonies conducted by **local veterans organizations**. This ensures that each flag is laid to rest with the dignity befitting the ideals it represents.

This program is a **collaborative effort** between my office, local veterans groups, the Cuyahoga County Public Library system, and Grocery Outlet. It will operate **year-round**, giving everyone in our community ongoing access to a proper flag retirement option. I invite you to take part in this effort — not only to ensure our flags are treated with the respect they've earned, but also to honor the values and sacrifices they symbolize.



### State Rep. Brennan Criticizes State Teacher Retirement System (STRS) Board Undemocratic, Unvetted Overhaul

COLUMBUS – **State Rep. Sean Patrick Brennan**, a retired public school teacher and member of the House Pensions Committee and Ohio Retirement Study Council, today issued the following statement in response to a last-minute proposal to dramatically restructure the State Teachers Retirement System (STRS) Board of Trustees:

"The move to strip directly elected teacher and retiree representation from the STRS Board is deeply troubling - both in its substance and the way it was pushed forward - literally in the middle of the night. This structural overhaul was introduced without meaningful transparency, without stakeholder input, and without the careful vetting a change of this magnitude demands. The other state pension systems should take heed, as they could be next.

I have said all along: the structure of the STRS Board is not the fundamental problem. The issue is whether the right people are elected and appointed—people who are

ethical, informed, and accountable to the members whose retirement security is at stake.



Rather than strengthening the system, this proposal diminishes the voice of working educators and retirees—those who pay into and rely on STRS every day. Reducing the number of elected contributing and retired members and stacking the board with political appointees not only silences the voices of frontline educators, but risks turning this vital system into a tool for partisan control.

Let me be clear: I believe in oversight and reform when necessary. But reform should mean better transparency, improved member communication, and evidence-based decision-making—not sidelining the very people who built and fund the retirement system. Any change to the STRS Board structure should be developed in the open, with robust public dialogue and participation from the people most affected. This is not reform—it's a power grab," said **Rep. Brennan.**
