The fact that only 17 bills have become law since I was sworn in and that I am in my first term, makes me especially proud. But, when you treat your colleagues with the respect they deserve, even when you do not agree, you can get good things done together.

I am very blessed to represent a very compact district that encompasses Parma, Parma Heights, and about one-third of Cleveland's West Park. Many of my colleagues in the Ohio General Assembly represent multiple counties! I am personal friends with all of our elected leaders and their staffs, I see constituents everywhere I go, and I am able to attend hundreds of community events each year. ## Representative Sean Patrick Brennan Introduces Bill to Honor Slain Local Trainman

**COLUMBUS:** State Representative Sean Patrick Brennan (D-Parma) has introduced legislation to designating exit 12A at W. 150<sup>th</sup> Street off of I-480 in Cleveland as the "Louis P. Shuster Memorial Interchange."

On March 7, 2023, Lou Shuster, a proud member of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers and Trainman (BLET), was riding his Norfolk-Southern railcar near the Cleveland Cliffs steel mill in Cleveland, when around 1:19 am a dump truck driver stopped at a stop sign at the railroad tracks and then proceeded forward, striking the front left side of the first train car. Shuster was positioned on the outside of the train car and was struck and crushed. Shuster was only 46 years old.

"Naming the West 150<sup>th</sup> Street exit in honor of Brother Lou is a beautiful tribute that his fellow union brothers and sisters will see each shift they go to work in the train yard located at the end of the exit ramp," Brennan said, adding, "It will also remind us all of the importance of rail safety and of being extra cautious when entering a railroad intersection."

Beginning his railroad career as a conductor in 2005, after serving our country in the U.S. Army, Shuster was promoted to locomotive engineer in 2014. He became a member of the Brother of Locomotive Engineers and Trainmen in 2016 and served on the Board as the Veterans Affairs Delegate for Norfolk-Southern and the Wheeling-Lake Erie. He was a 1995 graduate of South High in Cleveland.

At home, Shuster was a son and caregiver for his parents, Louis and Paulette, a father of 16-year-old Ethan, and a loving brother. The Shuster family is incredibly close, with three generation living together, as Lou shared a home with his brother George, who sadly died a couple of months earlier, his son Ethan, and his, also now late, parents. He was also the dearest brother of Annie Frazee, and uncle to Christopher, Nicholas, Katherine and Benjamin.

Pat Redmond, local chairman of BLET Division 607, says that Shuster "was a passionate and dedicated union brother. He was always there for his co-workers. He was very active in helping veterans who worked on the railroad and veterans all across our community."

H.B. 381 passed the Ohio House Transportation Committee unanimously on February 13 and is now on its way to the full House for consideration.

While teaching, he also spent 19 years on Parma City Council as ward two councilman from 2004-2010 and President of

As I am out in the community, many residents ask me questions about the Ohio General Assembly. I always love these questions because I taught American Government and American History for three decades. So, I thought I would dedicate this space to a primer about the legislative or law-making branch of Ohio's state government.

First, the Ohio General Assembly is a *bicameral* legislature, meaning it has two branches or houses: the Ohio House of Representatives and the Ohio Senate. I serve as one of the 99 members of the Ohio House of Representatives. Each of us has our own district composed of around 120,000 constituents—those who live in our district that we represent. We have 2-year terms and are limited to four consecutive terms.

On the other hand, the Ohio Senate is composed of 33 members, each with their own district. A Senate district encompasses three House districts. Senators have a 4-year term and are limited to two consecutive terms.

In order for a bill to become a law in the state of Ohio, it must pass both the House and Senate. First, a bill is introduced by a member of the House or Senate. Once introduced, it is then sent to the ap-

propriate committee to be vetted. If the bill passes committee, it is then sent to the floor of that house for a vote. If the bill passes the floor vote, it is sent to the other house and referred to committee. Should it pass that committee, it is sent to that house's floor for a vote. If it passes, it is then sent to the governor. The governor may sign the bill into law or veto the bill. If the governor vetoes the bill, the House and Senate can override the veto with a 3/5 majority vote of both houses. If that occurs, the bill becomes a law without the governor's signature. Keep in mind that this is the simplified process, as there are other things that go on and other steps that may occur.
