# Recreational Cannabis License Updates

Issue 2 created the Division of Cannabis Control (DCC) within the Department of Commerce, and tasked the DCC with developing rules for implementing the Cannabis Social Equity and Jobs Program (CSEJ) .The DCC submitted rules for distributing non-medical cannabis dispensary 10(B) licenses to the CSI to determine whether the rules are so onerous that they might hinder or impede the creation of jobs with the CSEJ program. The DCC also provided an opportunity for the general public to submit questions and comments until Tuesday, March13th.

On January 30th the House Minority Caucus held a press conference unveiling the first step in our Cost of Corruption legislation package. The Ohio Anti-Corruption Act (HB 112), HB 6 Repeal and Repay Act (HB 120), the PUCO Nomination Reform Act (HB 363) and the strives to weed out corruption, strengthen ethics, protect against and correct wrongs created by the First Energy scandal, the largest public corruption scandal in Ohio's history.



• The **PUCO Consumer Refund Act** (Rep. Baker) would require PUCO to order refunds to consumers in the event that a utility charges are unlawful by the Ohio Supreme Court. Upon determination that utility chares are unlawful, full refunds would be required to be issued.

- The economic impact of government corruption on families and taxpayers has been enormous.
  Through increased electric bills and fee hikes approved with criminal acts, taxpayers and Ohio families will pay over one-billion dollars, or \$500k a day
- Despite these crimes and the economic hit to Ohio families, small businesses, and consumers, not one reform has been passed or fully endorsed by Republicans over the past five years.
