


Required Trave

LEGISLATION UPDATE: OPERATING BUDGET

Our office has received hundreds of emails with concerns about Ohio's recently proposed operating budget, so I wanted to give you a quick update on where things stand. As you may know, the House recently passed **House Bill (HB) 96**, the state operating budget. My Democratic colleagues and I unanimously <u>voted NO</u> because the bill recklessly cuts critical programs and fails to meet the real needs of everyday Ohioans.

This budget includes harmful provisions such as:

- <u>Dismantling the Fair School Funding Plan:</u> undoing a bipartisan, expert-driven formula that ensures Ohio's public schools receive equitable and constitutional funding. Nearly 90 percent of Ohio students attend their local public schools;
- Offering No Real Property Tax Relief: Failing to provide real property tax relief for the thousands of Ohioans who have reached out to their lawmakers asking them to act. Instead, Republicans have put forward a fake and unvetted plan that very well may raise Ohioans property tax bills and punish public schools for responsible financial planning, forcing more levies at a time when homeowners' tax bills are already too high;
- <u>Risking Medicaid Expansion for Nearly 800,000 Ohioans:</u> by including a trigger that would end Medicaid expansion if there is even a one-dollar decrease in the federal funding share. This puts healthcare access and rural hospitals at serious risk;
- <u>Cutting Library Funding:</u> Reduces public library funding from what libraries currently receive in State funding by \$40M in FY '26 when compared to projected FY '25. The current budget risks nearly a \$100 million funding cut compared to the Governor's proposal, and eliminates the long-standing Public Library Fund, which has provided stable support for Ohio's libraries for nearly a century;
- <u>Cutting Funding for Clean Water Programs:</u> cuts nearly \$120 million (nearly 45% of funding) from the H2Ohio program. This program is essential for addressing algal blooms, lead contamination, and other threats to safe drinking water;
- <u>Attacking Collective Bargaining and Organized Labor:</u> Attacks unions and collective bargaining by prohibiting workers from negotiating about their working location assignments both in an education setting and as a state employee.

I voted no, not for politics, but because Ohioans deserve a budget that invests in public education, health care, childcare, and strong communities. You can still make your voice heard as this bill moves forward in the legislative process.
