LEGISLATIVE PRIORITIES FOR 2026

**Supporting Working Families, Protecting Access to Care, Keeping Children and Communities Safe,
Lowering Costs for Families, Real Property Tax Relief, and Reducing Utility Costs!**

Rep. Bryant Bailey Upcoming Legislative Proposals:

Emergency Services Coverage:

Addressing emergency services coverage to ensure working families, especially those managing pre-existing or chronic conditions, can seek emergency care without fear of overwhelming costs.

Access to Menopause and Perimenopause Care:

Addressing the cost of perimenopause and menopausal treatments, including hormone therapies, to ensure women have the coverage they need at a critical time.

Radon Testing and Prevention:

Ohio continues to see elevated radon levels in schools and housing. This proposal would address mandated testing to help keep children and families safe.

FOUR LAWS THAT GO INTO EFFECT THIS YEAR

MINIMUM WAGE INCREASE

Based on the inflation amendment, Ohio

Minimum wage increases to:

\$11.00/hr for non-tipped workers

\$5.50/hr for tipped workers

**As of Jan. 1, 2026, seventeen states plus Washington, D.C. have
statewide minimum wages at or above \$15 per hour.**

We should be one of them!

PHONE BAN IN SCHOOLS

The State Operating Budget requires schools districts to create a phone policy to reduce in school phone usage and cyberbullying.

Bans cell phone use during the school day (first bell to last bell)

Exceptions:

- Emergency use and active threats
- For monitoring health conditions



SENATE BILL 56 - ADULT USE CANNABIS

Bans the sale of intoxicating hemp outside of dispensaries

Creates a cap on the amount of Cannabis allowed in
dispensaries



Bans smoking in most public areas



Reduces THC levels in most adult use cannabis extracts to
a maximum of 70%

HOUSE BILL 57 - OVERDOSE REVERSAL MEDICATIONS IN SCHOOLS

Allows school to store and use overdose reversal medications like Naxolone to prevent fatal overdoses. Medication must be securely stored and accessible to trained personnel for quick use during emergencies.

We are so grateful for the incredible work their team is doing to protect and provide a safe space for domestic violence victims.




JobsOhio Small Business Grant

Funding for small businesses in distressed communities or businesses owned by underrepresented populations.

- Provides up to \$50,000 for eligible small business projects in distressed communities or businesses owned by underrepresented populations
- Supports projects that create or retain jobs, increase payroll, or improve operational efficiency over a three-year period
- Businesses must be in a JobsOhio-targeted industry (B2B service providers may qualify); retail and restaurants are not eligible
- Companies must have at least one year of operation and \$100,000 in annual revenue

Eligible Uses:

- Building purchase, renovation, or lease improvements
- Machinery, equipment, and technology upgrades
- Site development, environmental remediation, and demolition
- Workforce training costs and wages for on-the-job training
- Infrastructure and utility improvements

Governor's Merit Scholarship

The Governor's Merit Scholarship provides up to **\$5,000** in financial assistance to high school seniors who are identified as being in the **top 5%** of their class. The GMS is renewable for up to four years of full-time instruction.
